1988-1989 NEH FELLOWSHIPS

The Humanities

In the act that established the National Endowment for the Humanities, the term *humanities* includes, but is not limited to, the study of the following disciplines: history; philosophy; languages; linguistics; literature; archaeology; jurisprudence; the history, theory, and criticism of the arts; ethics; comparative religion; and those aspects of the social sciences that employ historical or philosophical approaches.

NEH Fellowships

NEH Fellowships provide opportunities for individuals to pursue independent study and research that will enhance their capacities as teachers, scholars, or interpreters of the humanities and that will enable them to make significant contributions to thought and knowledge in the humanities. NEH Fellowships are offered through two programs, and the program to which an applicant may apply depends on the applicant's institutional affiliation or circumstances:

Fellowships for University Teachers

This program is open to faculty members of departments and programs in universities that grant the Ph.D. and faculty members of post-graduate professional schools.

Fellowships for College Teachers and Independent Scholars

This program is open to faculty members of two-year, four-year, and five-year colleges, university faculty members in departments that do not grant the Ph.D., individuals affiliated with institutions other than colleges and universities, and scholars and writers working independently.

The programs are designed to support a range of people from those who have made significant contributions to the humanities to those who stand at the beginning of their careers. Work supported by NEH Fellowships may contribute to scholarly knowledge, to the conception and substance of individual courses in the humanities, or to the general public's understanding of the humanities. Projects may address broad topics or consist of study and research in a specialized field.

Applicants for NEH Fellowships need not have advanced degrees, but neither candidates for degrees nor persons seeking support for work toward a degree are eligible to apply.

Successful applicants may begin tenure of their fellowships as early as January 1, 1988, and as late as the beginning of the spring term of the 1988-89 academic year.

Selection Criteria

Applications for NEH Fellowships will be evaluated according to the quality or the promise of quality of the applicant's work as a teacher, scholar, or interpreter of the humanities; the significance of the contribution that the proposed project will make to thought and knowledge in the applicant's field and to the humanities generally, either directly or indirectly; the conception, definition, organization, and description of the proposed project; and the likelihood that the applicant will complete the project.

Tenure: 6 to 12 months

Stipend: Up to \$27,500

Application Deadline: June 1, 1987

Award Notification: Mid-December, 1987

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NEH Fellowships are offered through two programs, and the program to which an applicant may apply depends on the applicant's institutional affiliation or circumstances:

Fellowships for University Teachers

This program is intended for faculty and staff members of Ph.D.-granting universities and of postgraduate professional schools.

Fellowships for College Teachers and Independent Scholars

This program is intended for faculty and staff members of two-year and four-year colleges and universities that do not grant the Ph.D., individuals affiliated with institutions other than colleges and universities, and scholars and writers working independently.

The programs are designed to support a range of people from those who have made significant contributions to the humanities to those who stand at the beginning of their careers. Work supported by NEH Fellowships may contribute to scholarly knowledge, to the conception and substance of individual courses in the humanities, or to the general public's understanding of the humanities. Projects may address broad topics or consist of study and research in a single field.

Dear Colleague:

You and your colleagues may not be aware of NEH Fellowships for which you are eligible; I hope you will help us change this situation by speaking to your colleagues and displaying the announcement poster I have enclosed.

The fellowships provide six to twelve months of full-time, uninterrupted support to scholars at work on projects in the humanities. Last year the number of applications from scholars at museums, historical societies, and research libraries suggested to us that perhaps many at such institutions were unaware of their eligibility. I hope you will help us invite these scholars to apply for the 1990 competition.

As you will note on the poster, the 1990 awards have a deadline of June 1, 1989. Two competitions will be held. One is for independent scholars, college teachers--at two and four year institutions, and scholars associated with museums, libraries, and historical societies. A second will be held for university faculty in Ph.D.-granting institutions. Full details are available in the guidelines, but I would like to mention here two recent and important policy changes: one permits the maximum stipend of \$27,500 to be used in calculating a six-month award. This change may be helpful to many potential applicants. The second is a change in the Endowment's definition of a "major grant," now raised to \$10,000 from \$6,000, thereby widening the eligibility for the June 1 deadline.
