## GENERAL INFORMATION

The Senior Fellowship program is intended for persons who already have considerable experience as scholars, teachers, writers, or interpreters of the humanities, and who have produced significant work. Its purpose is to help them progress in their research and further develop their abilities as scholars, teachers, and interpreters of the humanities by providing support for uninterrupted full-time study. Persons who are still at a relatively early point in their careers may be interested in the Endowment's program of Fellowships for Younger Humanists.

Applications are encouraged from persons with broad interests in the humanities as well as from scholars working in specialties. Applications may come from college and university faculty members, but also from others whose occupations engage them as interpreters of the humanities.

The work undertaken during the fellowship period may be study or research within the applicant's special interest, or it may be study in some other field that will help the applicant better understand his own field, enlarge his competence, and become a more broadly informed humanist.

The Endowment is particularly interested in studies that will contribute to better understanding of matters of national concern, but more traditional studies are supported as well.

During this period of the bicentennial observance of the American Revolution, the Endowment has a special interest in studies relating to the Revolutionary era and to the philosophical and social foundations of the Revolution and the establishment of our nation. This interest is directed not only to studies of the Revolutionary era itself, but also to studies of the origins and historical development of that era's ideals and institutions. Proposals to study the ways in which these ideals and institutions respond to the demands of the modern world are particularly encouraged.

Problems pertinent to an applicant's own teaching of his subject are an appropriate part of fellowship study, but proposals for the planning of

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curricula or the development of teaching materials are not eligible for fellowship support; nor are educational surveys or predominantly pedagogical studies. Such proposals should be submitted to the Endowment's Division of Education or to the U.S. Office of Education. Studies in psychology and the social sciences which are predominantly empirical or clinical rather than humanistic are not eligible for fellowship support.

Creative work or performance in the arts — such as the writing of fiction or poetry, painting, sculpture, musical performance or composition, acting, and dance — are excluded, as are studies directed toward teaching creative work and performance, rather than critical, historical, and theoretical understanding of the arts.

Although the Endowment cannot support sectarian work, teachers who hold appointments in schools or departments of divinity may now apply for fellowships, provided that the work to be supported is to be undertaken with scholarly objectivity and is designed to constitute a general contribution to humanistic knowledge.

Stipends and Tenure Senior fellowships are awarded for six to twelve con-(\$\forall \tinuous \text{ whole months of} tenure and carry a maximum stipend of \$18,000, prorated at \$1,500 a month for periods of less than a year. Fellows are allowed to supplement their Endowment awards with small grants from other sources during tenure but may not hold other major fellowships or grants, except sabbaticals or grants from their own institutions, during their fellowship tenure. Stipends for Fellows who will receive sabbatical or supplemental grant income will be set at a figure (not to exceed \$18,000 per annum) covering the difference between their support, from these other sources and \? their salaries plus travel expenses allowed by the Endowment. A Fellow must devote full time to his fellowship study and may not accept a teaching assignment or undertake any other major activity during the tenure of his fellowship.

Eligibility Requirements
Though persons who have entered their professions without advanced degrees are not excluded, degree candidates are not eligible, nor are persons seeking support for work leading toward degrees. Applicants must be citizens of the United States or native residents of its territorial possessions. They may not hold permanent posts at foreign institutions or have resided abroad for more than five consecutive years immediately prior to application.

Item 7: Applicants may request a tenure period of not fewer than six nor more than twelve continuous whole months a starting between January, 1974, and the beginning of the applicant's spring term of academic year 1974-75. Dates of tenure should include only the period of Endowment support. If fellowships are held concurrently with sabbaticals, stipends will be determined as explained above.

#### **ELIGIBILITY**

For experienced scholars, teachers, writers, or interpreters of the humanities who have produced significant work. #### SCOPE OF SUPPORT

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# Fellowships In Residence for College Teachers 1977-1978

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

#### Purpose and Scope

Fellowships in Residence for College Teachers are intended for teachers in undergraduate and two-year colleges who are concerned primarily with increasing their own knowledge and understanding of the subjects they teach in order to improve their teaching. The fellowships will be held in residence at designated universities throughout the country during the academic year 1977-1978. Under the program, Fellows participate in a seminar directed by a distinguished scholar and undertake personal programs of study and research, of their own choosing, over and beyond the work for the seminar. Sixteen seminars are being offered altogether in 1977-1978 in different disciplines of the humanities and the humanistic social sciences. Fourteen are open to all eligible applicants; two are open only to teachers in two-year colleges. The number of Fellows will vary from seminar to seminar, but will range from six to twelve, depending upon the quality of the applications and the total funds available. Through study, reflection, and discussion with the

seminar director and their colleagues in a seminar atmosphere, the college teachers will sharpen their understandings and improve their ability to convey their understandings to college students. The work for the seminar will allow Fellows ample time to pursue their personal studies. They will have the benefits in their work of access to a library suitable for advanced study and research and the presence of scholars and colleagues in their fields, as well as full use of the library and auditing privileges in courses and seminars.

The seminars are especially designed for the College Teacher Fellowship program and are not intended to be identical to courses normally offered, nor will graduate credit be given for them. While attention to the problem of conveying humanistic understandings to college students will be an integral part of the seminar discussions, the focus is primarily substantive, and their purpose should not be construed as pedagogical training or curriculum planning.

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

Item 9: Since the face sheet of the application is used independently for certain purposes, the abstract of the proposal should be restricted to the space provided on page 1 of the form. It should not be a mere reference to the body of the application.

Item 12: Referees should be persons who are thoroughly familiar with the applicant's professional capabilities and accomplishments. The applicant is advised to select no more than one referee from his home institution. He is also advised to select referees who are themselves conversant with scholarship and teaching in his field. At least one referee should be asked to comment particularly upon the applicant's competence as a teacher and interpreter of humanistic knowledge.

Item 16: To be eligible, an applicant must be a citizen or national of the United States by the time of application deadline. The term "U.S. National" designates a native resident of a possession of the United States, such as American Samoa. It does not refer to a citizen of another country who has applied for United States citizenship.

#### SUPPORTING INFORMATION

In an appended statement of not more than five typed pages (single spaced), applicants should submit supporting information about themselves and their proposed study in sufficient detail to make possible an adequate evaluation of their applications. The personal information and the description of the proposed study are essential to the application. No application will be considered without a curriculum vitae. Books or articles or similar materials should not be submitted in support of applications. Although no particular form is prescribed, the statement should include the information indicated below.

Personal Information An applicant should give his curriculum vitae∧ This should include (1) a record of his education, (2) a list of academic honors or awards he has received, (3) his employment record, and (4) a list of his publications. He should indicate the source, the length of tenure, the dollar amount, and the nature of any fellowship or grant received for tenure during academic year 1968-69 or after, or else indicate that he has not received any. Other considerations being equal, preference will be given to persons who have not held major post-doctoral fellowships or grants since 1968, except sabbaticals.

#### Description of **Proposed Study**

This description should be written in plain, jargon-free language. It will be reviewed by scholars and laymen drawn tail stages of reven from various fields, many of whom will, not have a specialized knowledge of the applicant's field of study. The proposal should therefore be addressed to literate humanists within and outside the applicant's field of study who will be interested in the proposal primarily as a contribution to the advancement of humanistic knowledge, broadly conceived, and to the applicant's development as a teacher and interpreter of the humanities, and only secondarily as an immediate contribution to learning in a particular field.

Sources of

The description should cover the following points:

- A. The specific program of general or specialized study planned for the fellowship period, the basic theses or queries to be explored and the ways in which the study will be pursued under the fellowship;
- B. An indication of the current state of the study: whether it is just beginning or in progress, the progress to date, stages yet to be completed, and the plans for each stage;
- C. Relation of proposed study to the applicant's immediate and long-range study and research objectives;

- D. The importance of the proposed study to the improvement of the applicant's competence as a *teacher and interpreter* of humanistic knowledge;
- E. Its significance to humanistic knowledge;
- F. The extent to which it furthers a better understanding of matters of national concern;
- G. Relationship of the applicant's interest to that of other scholars working in the same general field;
  - H. Location where study will be conducted, with an indication of the likelihood of access to archives, collections, or institutions, if needed;
  - I. The applicant's ability to read, speak, and understand any foreign languages needed for the proposed study;
  - J. The possibility of finding support for the work through a publisher's contract or advance (if there is any reason to expect that it will result in a commercially profitable publication);
  - K. Short selected bibliography (not more than one page) of publications which have the greatest relevance to the proposed study.

#### REFERENCE LETTERS

It is the applicant's responsibility to complete the top part of the reference letter form and send the letter, together with a copy of page 1 of his application, or the whole application if he wishes, to each of his referees. It is also his responsibility to request his referees to send their letters directly to the Endowment, addressed to the Division of Fellowships. Although reference letters need not arrive at the Endowment before the application deadline, they should be sent as soon as possible.

Notification of the outcome of this application will be sent to the home address given on these cards.

## ACKNOWLEDGMENT CARD

The applicant should address the enclosed postcard to himself and return it with his application. The Endowment will use it to acknowledge receipt of the application.
