Presentation of Medals



The National Dance Institute was founded in 1976 by Jacques d'Amboise in the belief that the arts have a unique power to engage children and motivate them toward excellence. Each year, the programs of NDI inspire thousands of children, reaching across social, ethnic, and economic boundaries including those children facing physical and emotional challenges. NDI sponsors residency and affiliated programs throughout the United States and approximately three thousand children participate in these programs annually. Using professional artists and a distinctive combination of dance classes, performances and educational materials, the National Dance Institute fosters a love of the arts, a pride of achievement, and a curiosity about the world in all the children that it touches. The Institute also develops annual curriculum guides for classroom teachers to foster an integration of the arts with traditional classroom subjects. These children develop discipline, a standard of excellence, and a belief in themselves that will carry over into all aspects of their lives.
