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NEH RESEARCH CONFERENCES, SPRING 1995-SPRING 1996

The Division of Research Programs announces thirteen research conferences between Spring 1995 and Spring 1996 that are being supported by the National Endowment for the Humanities. These conferences are designed to advance scholarly research in the humanities. Some of the conferences will award small travel subsidies on a competitive basis to junior faculty and graduate students who wish to attend. In most cases the public is also welcome. Those needing additional information should call or write the conference project directors.

APPLYING FOR SUPPORT TO HOLD FUTURE CONFERENCES

Grants made in the Conferences program advance the state of research in a field or topic of major importance in the humanities. They bring together scholars working on related topics in one or several disciplines at a time when the open exchange of ideas will most benefit ongoing research. A conference may respond to the recognition of a critical juncture in research on a particular topic, the availability of new data or materials, or the need to integrate the results of disparate studies and other developments that affect future directions for research.

All projects should have a specific set of research objectives that can best be achieved by a conference. Presenters and discussants at conferences usually number ten to thirty and should be those scholars, junior and senior, American and foreign, whose current work and interests make them best suited to contribute to the discussion. The number of other participants may vary, depending on the nature of the conference, and may include faculty from a wide

range of institutions, undergraduate and graduate students, and members of the public. In addition to the costs of publicizing and conducting the conference, grants support travel and other expenses for primary participants. A limited number of stipends may also be available to offset travel and per diem expenses for other persons, such as graduate students and junior faculty, who may wish to attend. Endowment funds may be applied to the costs of preparing conference proceedings for publication, though not to the actual costs of publication. In Conferences, as in all the Research Division's programs, applicants are encouraged to consult a member of the staff before submitting a final application.

APPLICATION DEADLINES

For Conferences, there are two annual application deadlines for sponsoring organizations: May 15 (notification by December) and December 15 (notification by August of the following year). Conferences should normally not be scheduled for less than five months after notification. Information on the programs of the Research Division is available from the
