These fellowships are for scholars and other interpreters of the humanities who can make significant contributions to humanistic thought and knowledge. Applications are welcome from college and university faculty members and from others who work in the humanities, from people with broad humanistic interests as well as from scholars working in specialties. While continuing its commitment to the work of established, senior scholars, the Endowment, through this program, particularly wishes to encourage and sustain the work of younger scholars. This includes both those who hold the rank of instructor or assistant professor and those who, while not employed by any academic institution, stand at an early stage of their careers.

## **Fellowships for College Teachers**

Tenure: 6 or 12 Months Stipend: Up to \$22,000

Application Deadline: June 2, 1980 Award Announcement: Early Dec., 1980

These fellowships provide opportunities for college teachers to pursue full-time independent study and research that will enhance their abilities as teachers and interpreters of the humanities. The program is intended for teachers in two-year, four-year, and five-year colleges and universities which do not have means to support advanced study and research, and work proposed may be either a program of general study or a research project, whichever individual applicants judge to be more appropriate to their needs and concerns.

#### **Residential Fellowships for College Teachers**

Tenure: 9 or 12 Months Stipend: Up to \$20,000

Application Deadline: November 10, 1980 Award Announcement: Early March, 1981

These fellowships provide opportunities for teachers in undergraduate colleges to participate in seminars directed by distinguished scholars at designated universities and to undertake research and study of their own choosing beyond the work of the seminars. Teachers in two-year, four-year, and five-year colleges and universities are eligible to apply. Faculty members of departments with doctoral programs are not eligible to apply to this program. Former recipients of Residential Fellowships for College Teachers are no longer excluded from applying for participation in these seminars, although strong preference will be given to applicants who have not had major fellowships in recent years.
