The National Endowment for the Humanities, through its fellowship programs, encourages and supports advanced study and research in humanistic disciplines by people of diverse interests, backgrounds, and circumstances: senior scholars; younger scholars; non-academics; faculty members at institutions which are oriented toward research; teachers in two-year, four-year, and five-year colleges and universities.

As various as the people are the activities and projects eligible for support: projects designed to enhance a person's teaching; studies of a broad, interpretive intent; highly specialized research; and projects designed to develop or enlarge a person's understanding of the humanities.

NEH Fellows need not have advanced degrees, but neither candidates for degrees nor persons seeking support for work toward a degree are eligible to apply.

Fellowships are offered through three programs, two providing for independent work and one for seminar work. A person may not apply in the same year for both a Fellowship for Independent Study and Research and a Fellowship for College Teachers. A person may apply to one of these programs and also to the Endowment's third fellowship program, Residential Fellowships for College Teachers, but may not receive more than one award in a given year. If funds are available to offer Residential Fellowships in 1982-1983, the seminar topics, directors, and locations will be announced in the early fall of 1981.

**Fellowships for Independent Study
and Research**

Tenure: **6 or 12 Months**
Stipend: **Up to \$22,000**
Application Deadline: **June 1, 1981**
Award Announcement: **Early December, 1981**

These fellowships are for scholars and other interpreters of the humanities who can make significant contributions to humanistic thought and knowledge. Applications are welcome from college and university faculty members and from others who work in the humanities, from people with broad humanistic interests as well as from scholars working in specialties. While continuing its commitment to the work of established, senior scholars, the Endowment, through this program, particularly wishes to encourage and sustain the work of younger scholars. This group includes both faculty members who hold the rank of instructor or assistant professor and people who have no academic affiliation but stand at comparably early stages in their careers. Successful applicants may begin tenure of their fellowships as early as January 1, 1982, and as late as the beginning of the spring term of the 1982-1983 academic year.

Fellowships for College Teachers

Tenure: **6 or 12 Months**
Stipend: **Up to \$22,000**
Application Deadline: **June 1, 1981**
Award Announcement: **Early December, 1981**

These fellowships provide opportunities for college teachers to pursue full-time independent study and research that will enhance their abilities as teachers, scholars, or interpreters of the humanities and enable them to make contributions to their profession. This program is intended for teachers in two-year, four-year, and five-year colleges and universities; and faculty members of departments with doctoral programs are not eligible to apply. Work proposed may range from a program of general study to specialized research, whatever individual applicants judge to be appropriate to their needs and concerns. Successful applicants may begin tenure of their fellowships as early as January 1, 1982, and as late as the beginning of the spring term of the 1982-1983 academic year.
