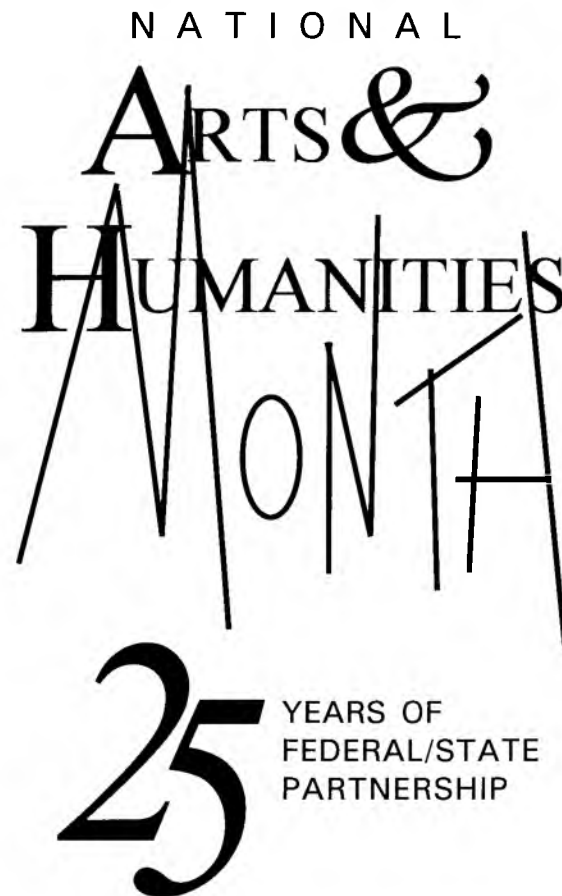

Over the last 25 years, the National Endowment for the Humanities has invested \$582 million in humanities councils in each of the 50 states, and the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa, Guam, and the Northern Mariana Islands.

In October, the NEH and the humanities councils are celebrating National Arts and Humanities Month in a variety of ways, beginning with the national film premiere of *TR: The Story of Theodore Roosevelt*.
