GENERAL INFORMATION

Purpose and Scope

NEH Fellowships in Category B provide opportunities for persons who are engaged primarily in undergraduate teaching to pursue full-time study and research. These fellowships are intended to help them to enhance their abilities as teachers as well as to make important contributions to humanistic thought and knowledge. Applicants may propose to work within their special interest, or to study in some other area to help improve their understanding of their own fields. Proposals in this category should have a role in the improvement of the applicant's teaching.


Applicants should be primarily engaged, or intending careers, in undergraduate teaching, that is, they should be faculty members of undergraduate colleges or graduate universities whose day-to-day responsibilities lie more in undergraduate teaching than in research and working with graduate students. University teachers in the early years of their careers should consider applying in this category.

Criteria of Selection

Applications for Fellowships in Category B are reviewed by panels of college and university teachers, scholars, and other humanists who are within and outside the applicant's field of study. Fellows will be selected on the basis of the following criteria:

- the quality of the applicant's work, or the promise of quality, as a scholar and as a teacher;
- the importance of the proposed study as a contribution to knowledge and to the applicant's abilities as a teacher;
- the conception, definition, and organization of the proposed program of study and research; and
- 4) the likelihood that the study will be completed.

Strong preference will be given to persons who have not held major fellowships or other leave-providing grants, except sabbaticals, since 1973-1974.

The scope of Endowment support includes, but is not limited to, the study of the following: history, philosophy, languages, linguistics, literature, archaeology, jurisprudence, history and criticism of the arts, ethics, comparative religion, and those aspects of the social sciences that employ historical or philosophical approaches, including cultural anthropology, sociology, political theory, international relations, and other subjects concerned primarily with questions of value rather than quantitative matters. The Endowment continues its interest in studies of the relationships between human values and science and technology. Studies in psychology and the social sciences that are predominantly empirical or clinical rather than humanistic are not eligible for Endowment Fellowship support.

Problems pertinent to the substance of an applicant's own teaching are an appropriate part of fellowship study, but applications for the planning of curricula or the development of teaching materials, predominantly pedagogical studies, and educational surveys are not eligible for fellowship support. Inquiries about the possibility of Endowment support for educational projects should be directed to the Endowment's Division of Education Programs.

Work in the creative or performing arts — such as writing of fiction or poetry, painting, sculpture, musical composition or performance, acting, directing, and dance — is excluded, as are studies directed toward teaching composition and performance. However, critical, historical, and theoretical studies of the arts are eligible for support.

Although the Endowment cannot support sectarian work, teachers who hold appointments in schools of theology or departments of religion may apply for fellowships, provided that the work to be supported is designed to constitute a general contribution to humanistic knowledge.

Stipends and Tenure

NEH Fellowships in Category B are awarded for continuous periods of either six or twelve months, with maximum stipends of \$10,000 for six months and \$20,000 for twelve. Stipends for 1980-1981 Fellows will be based on 1979-1980 salary, minus sabbatical and other grants. Although some assistance may be provided to help defray the costs of necessary travel, no special allowance is given for any other research expense.

Fellows may supplement their awards with small grants from other sources, but may hold no other major fellowships or grants during fellowship tenure except sabbaticals and grants from their own institutions.

Fellows may begin tenure of their awards any time between January 1, 1980, and the beginning of the spring term of the 1980-1981 academic year.

Fellows must devote full time to the fellowship study, and may not accept teaching assignments or undertake other major activities during the tenure of their fellowships. Applicants who receive offers of fellowships from other foundations after submitting their applications to NEH must decline the former or withdraw the latter.

Eligibility

Although applicants need not have advanced degrees to qualify, those applicants whose professional training includes a degree program must have received their degree or completed all requirements for it by the application deadline. Persons seeking support for work leading toward a degree are not eligible to apply, nor are candidates for degrees, even if they expect to have finished all work for their degree by the time they would begin tenure of the fellowship and the work proposed is not related to their degree program.

Other Fellowship Programs

NEH Fellowships (besides NEH Fellowships in Category B):


NEH Fellowships in Category A provide support for independent study and research to scholars, teachers, and others whose work seems likely to lead to significant contributions to humanistic thought and knowledge. (The applicant's teaching is not a major consideration in awarding Category A Fellowships.) The application deadline for these fellowships for 1980-81 is also June 1, 1979.

NEH Fellowships in Category C provide opportunities for teachers in undergraduate and two-year colleges to participate in seminars directed by distinguished scholars at designated universities and to undertake research and study of their own choosing over and above the work of the seminar. Faculty members of departments with doctoral programs are not eligible to apply in this category. The application deadline for these fellowships for 1980-1981 is November 13, 1979.

Summer Stipends provide support for college, university, and junior or community college teachers and others working in the humanities to pursue two consecutive months in full-time study or research. The application deadline for 1980 is October 15, 1979.

Persons may apply for support to the Division of Fellowships under only one of the programs listed above during a single year.

In addition, the Division offers Summer Seminars for College Teachers and Fellowships for the Professions. Applicants to other divisional programs may also apply to attend a Summer Seminar. However, no one may accept an award under more than one program in a single year. Fellows may not participate in NEH Summer Seminars during the year (or years) in which they hold NEH Fellowships.

APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS

General

A complete application will consist of the following documents:

- a proposal, which includes a) an original, signed two-page application form, b) a curriculum vitae, and c) a detailed description of the proposed study;
- eight collated copies of the full proposal;
- 3) twin 5 x 8 data cards:
- 4) a set of cards A and B;
- 5) a set of labels; and
- 6) three letters of recommendation, submitted separately on reference letter forms.

Applicants should make and keep an additional copy of their application for their own records.

The application deadline is June 1, 1979, and awards will be announced late in November, 1980.

Application Form

Item 3: Applicants must have completed their professional training by June 1, 1979. Degree candidates or persons seeking support for work leading toward a degree may not apply for fellowships. Applicants who have completed all the requirements for their degrees but do not have their degrees in hand must ask the deans of their graduate schools to certify that all requirements have been met by the application deadline.

Item 6: Applicants should use the fields listed on the back of the 5 x 8 index cards.

Item 7: The title of the proposed topic should be short and should serve to identify the subject of study at a glance.

Item 9: Applicants may request fellowship tenure for either six or twelve consecutive, whole months. Tenure may start any time between January 1, 1980, and the beginning of the spring term of the academic year 1980-1981.

Item 10: Applicants should be citizens of the United States, native residents of territorial possessions of the United States, or foreign nationals who have been resident in the United States for at least three years immediately preceding the date of application. Item 11: Applicants should summarize the points which are developed in their appended statements. They should not merely refer to the body of the application, since the face sheet is used independently for certain purposes. The summary should be limited to the space provided on page 1 of the form, and should not be continued on another page.

Item 16: Referees should be persons familiar with the applicant's professional capabilities and accomplishments. It is advisable to select referees who are themselves conversant with scholarship and teaching in the applicant's field. Applicants should include as at least one of their referees a person who knows their ability as a teacher of undergraduates, such as a colleague, the department chairman, dean, or president of the college. It is desirable that applicants not select all of their referees from their own institution.

Supporting Information

Applicants should submit supporting information about themselves and their proposed studies in not more than five typed pages (single-spaced). This appended statement should consist of a curriculum vitae and a description of the proposed study, and cover the points specified below. Books, articles, and similar materials should not be submitted in support of applications.

The supporting information is essential to the application. No application can be considered without a curriculum vitae. Applicants should also bear in mind that the description of their project may be the only demonstration a reviewer will have of the quality of their work, and should therefore describe their proposed project in sufficient detail to make possible an adequate evaluation. Since

some of the reviewers may not have a specialized knowledge of the applicant's field of study, the proposed study should be described in plain, non-technical English.

Personal Information

The curriculum vitae should be in outline form and include 1) a record of the applicant's education, including the titles of any recent theses or dissertations, 2) a record of employment, 3) a list of the most important academic honors or awards received, and 4) a list of the applicant's major or most relevant publications. The applicant should indicate the source, length of tenure, dollar amount, and nature of any fellowship or grant received for tenure during 1974-1975 or any later academic year, or else indicate that none have been received. In the case of research grants, the applicant should state whether the grant provided any terms of leave. Strong preference will be given to persons who have not held major fellowships or other leave-providing grants, except sabbaticals, since 1973-1974.

Description of Proposed Study

Although no particular form is prescribed, the description of the study should cover the points listed below.

- A. The specific program of study and research. The basic ideas, problems, or questions to be examined should be stated and explained and the applicant's approach and line of thought should be illustrated to the extent that it has been worked out.
- B. If the proposed project is part of a larger, long-term study, the applicant should describe its current state that is, whether it is just beginning or in progress, the progress to date, stages yet to be completed, the plans for each stage, and how the part of the study to be done under the fellowship fits into the whole.

- C. The contribution of the study to the development of the applicant's abilities as a scholar and a teacher.
- D. The significance of the study to the applicant's field and to humanistic knowledge generally.
- E. The relationship of the applicant's proposal to the work of other scholars in the same field and the distinctiveness of the applicant's proposed contribution.
- F. The location where the study will be conducted, and the likelihood of access to archives, collections, or institutions, if pertinent.
- G. The applicant's ability to read, speak, and understand any foreign languages needed for the study.
- H. The possibility of finding support for the work through a publisher's contract or advance, in case there is any reason to expect that it will result in a commercially profitable publication.
- I. If the applicant plans to be connected during the period of tenure requested for the fellowship with any other project supported or under consideration by the Endowment, the applicant must explain how the work under the fellowship would fit in with the work of the other project.
- J. A short, selected bibliography (preferably no more than one page) of publications that have the greatest relevance to the proposed study.

Reference Letters

Applicants should complete the top part of the reference letter forms and send a form to each of their referees, together with a copy of page 1 of the application form (or the whole application if they wish). Moreover, applicants are responsible for requesting their referees to send their letters directly to the Endowment, addressed to the Division of Fellowships, and to make sure that the references are sent. Although reference letters need not arrive at the Endowment by the application deadline, they should be sent promptly.
