The Division of Research and Education Programs of the Mational Endowment for the Humanities each year offers teachers opportunities to study humanities topics in a variety of Summer Seminars and Summer Institutes. Teachers interested in participating in either a seminar or an institute should write to the project director listed on this poster to request information and application materials.



### **AMOUNT OF AWARD**

Participants in Summer Institutes generally have their room, board, and supplies paid for by the project and receive an additional stipend. All teachers selected to participate in a Summer Seminar will be awarded a stipend of \$2,450, \$2,825, or \$3,200 (depending on the length of the seminar) to cover travel costs to and from the seminar location, books and other research expenses, and living expenses. Additionally all Summer Seminar participants who teach in New Jersey will be awarded an additional travel stipend by the Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation of Morristown, New Jersey.

#### **ELIGIBILITY**

Full-time teachers in American K-12 schools, whether public, private, or church-affiliated, are eligible to apply to appropriate seminars and institutes. Americans teaching abroad are also eligible if a majority of the students they teach are American citizens. Librarians and school administrators may also be eligible. Applicants should consult the guidelines and application information received directly from seminar and institute directors concerning eligibility requirements. Selection committees are directed to give first consideration to applicants who have not participated in an NEH-supported seminar or institute in the last three years.

Please send or e-mail a request for application information and expanded project descriptions to the seminar and institute directors listed here. Information on any or all appropriate projects may be requested, but application may be made to only one seminar or institute. The application deadline for Summer Seminars and Institutes is March 1.
