

I N S T I T U T E S

Institutes for College and University Faculty provide intensive study of texts, historical periods, and ideas central to undergraduate teaching in the humanities. They take place in settings suitable for research, and they allow faculty to examine significant material under the direction of recognized scholars. They thus prepare faculty to return to their classrooms with a deeper knowledge of important scholarship in key fields of the humanities.

Institutes are sponsored by colleges, universities, libraries, museums, and professional organizations. Participation is open to full-time teachers in two-year and four-year colleges and universities, with twenty to thirty participants in a given institute selected in open competition by the institute's staff. The study program emphasizes collaborative work under the direction of a group of scholars. Participants in these four- to six-week summer institutes receive stipends of \$250 per week and an allowance for travel, room, and board.

S E M I N A R S

Each seminar includes twelve participants working in collaboration with one or two leading scholars. Participants will have access to a major library collection, with time reserved to pursue individual research and study projects.

*Seminars last from four to eight weeks. Participants receive a stipend **between \$2,450 and \$4,000**, depending on the length of the seminar.*

Participation is open to full- and part-time teachers in two- and four-year colleges and to independent scholars (including those employed by museums, libraries, etc.). Members of Ph.D.-granting departments are normally not eligible. Although an applicant need not hold an advanced degree in order to qualify, enrolled candidates for degrees are not eligible—with the single exception of faculty teaching in colleges full-time for at least three years. Applicants must be United States citizens or foreign nationals residing in the U.S. since 1993 or earlier. An individual may apply to no more than two seminars in any one year.
